PASTOR'S REPORT

2023 was a big year for Lakewood Presbyterian Church! You began the year with Rev. Tom Paine as your part-time transitional pastor. I didn't know you all yet, but from the stories I've heard, it was a season of rebuilding and adjusting to life in a post-pandemic world. Giving and attendance were slowly creeping their way up, just as the PNC got started on their work. Still, the long years of transition were marked by weariness and grief for many of you. There were many beloved members of the congregation who died during those years, and it seemed that more and more responsibilities were on the shoulders of fewer and fewer people.

In the spring, the PNC began interviewing candidates for the first full-time pastor position that this church has had in over three decades. I met with the PNC soon after the job description was posted, and we both quickly knew this could be a good fit. The PNC officially offered me the position in June, and we all began preparing for this big transition over the summer. You said goodbye to Pastor Tom in July and hello to me in mid-August. You thought the transitions were over, but you were quickly reminded— life is always full of change and transition.

My first months at LPC have been wonderful ones. I was immediately welcomed with gracious, open arms by so many of you. I spent the fall getting to know congregation members, the church culture, and the surrounding neighborhood and city of Lakewood. I still have a lot more to learn, but I am grateful for the time I've been able to spend getting to know this congregation. It's been a joy not only to get to know you but to give you the opportunity to know me and my family. We were *all* surprised by the news that I would be expecting twins in April 2024! While a long maternity leave certainly isn't what any of us expected my first year as pastor here to look like, I am constantly reminded that the best way to make God laugh is to tell God our plans;)

One of my first priorities since beginning my work here has been making Sunday worship more kid-friendly for our youngest worshippers. We are lucky to have a wonderful group of young children at our church and it has been so fun to help them engage in worship in an age-appropriate way. We introduced "worship bags" with activities for kids, including illustrated bulletins that follow the lectionary, and experimented with kid-friendly icons on the bulletins to help our non-readers follow the service. We started singing a hymn before and after Children's Time to introduce children to more church music and continued LPC's long tradition of welcoming children in worship, even (and especially!) with the noise and chaos they bring! Most importantly, we hired 3 nursery staff (one adult and two high schoolers that rotate Sundays) and now have a fully staffed nursery with a preschool aged curriculum for our kids. This is a huge blessing for families, and we hope will be a reason for new families to want to attend.

I am excited about what 2024 will hold for Lakewood Presbyterian Church. We don't yet know what the future holds for this congregation, but we know that we are going there together by the grace of God.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Our budget for 2023, has had to be reduced from 2022. We have had to reduce the budget every year for the past 4 years. Some of this is understandable because some members have died but that is not the only reason. I don't know all of the reasons.

A bright spot to this report is that envelope giving as well as overall General Fund giving was over the budgeted forecast amounts so our financial picture was better than we thought it would be at the start of 2023.

We continue to receive significant interest from our Morgan Stanley Money Market funds which were transferred from the Umpqua Bank Money Market. We have received over \$8,000 from this source in 2023.

For those that are new or unfamiliar to the financial information and to clarify the reports, income and expenses are divided into five groups: General Fund, Deacons' Fund, Designated Gifts, Special Offerings and Facility Improvements.

The General Fund, as the name implies, is for the general operation of the church (Pastor's and other salaries, utilities, etc.) These are the income and expenses that relate to the budget.

The other four groups are passed through and are not related to the budget. The income comes in and it goes out without any of the money being used for the ongoing operation of the church. Over time, income and expenditures for these groups will be equal.

- Deacons' Fund is money given to the Deacons' to support their mission.
- Designated Gifts are monies given for special purposes like the Memorial Fund or Pastor's Discretionary Fund. These contributions must be used for the purposes for which they were given.
- Special Offering include monies given to the 2 Cent a Meal offering and various denominational offerings like One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Christmas Joy and Peace Making Offerings. These are all pass-through categories except for a portion of Pentecost and Peace Making offerings.
- The Facilities Improvements consists of the Building Funds: Undesignated, Designated and other designated building fund projects.

Since we have hired a Full-Time Pastor, our expenses have increased significantly. While the Full-Time Pastor has increased our expenses, most all other expenses have increased as well. Utilities, Employee wages and our Security System costs have also increased significantly. Many other costs have increased too. We were aware of these increases and have been increasing our funds savings to cover these higher costs. We can cover the deficit in the budget for the foreseeable future. Obviously, we hope to grow the membership and increase our giving to cover these cost increases. We go forward in faith that God will provide.

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PERSONNEL

Our custodian, Andrea Rittenhouse, was the only church employee who didn't change this year. She will also continue to work in 2024. For budget constraints we did limit the number of hours she would work each week, even if there was more work to do, especially in the summer months with lawn maintenance. It is hoped she can prioritize the work and/or we will find more volunteer labor among the membership.

The PNC nominated our new pastor after extensive work of writing the mission statement of the church to take the bold step and select a full-time pastor after many years of having a part-time pastor. We said goodbye to our transitional pastor and welcomed Reverend Laura Nile Tuell, who received a unanimous vote from the congregation.

With our new pastor installed, it was decided to hire nursery attendants, so that parents can attend the worship instead of coming to church only to be in the nursery with their children. One adult and two teens were hired. During the month of December as part of their training and orientation, the three worked together with the understanding that the teens would share the job by working every other Sunday. By regulations we need to have two people working in the nursery no matter how few children there are. We are so grateful for the faithful parents with young children among our membership.

With the help of the Worship team and personnel, we began a search for a new pianist. We were so blessed to have Jennifer Matson with us for seven years but accepted her resignation and wished her continued success with her musical career. Her last day was January 7, 2024.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

2023 was a productive year but also an expensive year related to maintaining the property. We had leaks that were patched over the office wing of the church. The cost was \$16,500 and although the leak was repaired and the rainwater path rerouted, that part of the building is still not being used. There is asbestos in the ceiling and mold in the ceiling or carpeting. For the foreseeable future, that portion of the building is not being used. It is too costly to fix the asbestos and mold problems at this time.

We also have a ceiling leak over the kitchen, near the counters. The repair has been scheduled and the cost will be \$5500. We hope that is the last leak for a while. The roof is fairly old, and it is flat – two factors that do not favor elimination of leaks easily. We also have a beam over the eastside entrance to the building that needs replacement. It is not imminent that it will fail but we do need to keep an eye on it. If we have a sizable snowfall, we could have problems. It has not been repaired yet because of the cost. We also have a beam over the backyard stage area that needs replacement. Again, failure is not imminent but needs to be monitored.

We have had success, also. We repaired the office area roof and if/when we get funds to remove the asbestos/mold, that area will again be a valuable space. We also installed a locking gate to the upper parking lot. There were many "visitors" to that area that left a lot of garbage and other items, as we were a parking area for vagrants. The gate has eliminated many of these issues.

We completely rebuilt the basketball backboard, hoop and net; that activity gets used frequently. We've maintained the playground (pressure washed the structure and tightened the hardware) so that it stays in good shape. We also had two cleanup days and have a good-looking grounds area that is used quite a bit by the neighborhood community.

We continue to have challenged maintaining the building and grounds. We welcome anyone who would like to help us keep the facility in good shape.

SESSION ACTION

- The most significant highlight for 2023 was the search for and hiring of a new full-time pastor for the church. There is a full description of that event in a separate entry below.
- Marge Callahan started offering a "Gentle Yoga" class on Thursday mornings in Fellowship Hall. Participants were asked to donate food for the church's "Little Pantry" as payment for Marge's efforts. Session approved the project to help strengthen our contribution to the Little Pantry by the reader board in the church parking lot. Classes began in February.
- At February's Session meeting, Lakewood Pres joined other faith leaders in opposing the Gas Transmission NW pipeline expansion that threatened significant risk of harm. Of special concern was the status and risk to endangered salmon populations in the Pacific Northwest.
- That Session meeting also saw approval of an update to the church's Sonitrol Security system. The update allowed us to meet required federal standards for such systems.
- February also led Session to create a "Queen of the Kitchen." Chelsea Williamson first suggested the idea and once approved by Session she accepted the role. She will work with the sponsor of kitchen events. The "Queen" will not be expected to perform the work of preparing, serving, and cleaning but instead will coordinate those tasks with the event sponsor.
- February also saw another incident of vandalism at the church when two glass panels in the sanctuary were broken and allowed an intruder to enter the church. There were no thefts or other problems from the break in.
- Based upon the request brought to Session by member Susan Ford, Session considered and approved a motion of support for the Earth Ministry initiative that champions salmon protection.
- At the March meeting, Session studied and then passed a motion to support an Overture to the General Assembly on Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity. That overture was part of the action about LGBTQIA+ people in the Olympia Presbytery. If approved by the General Assembly, the Book of Order will be amended to include sexual orientation and gender identity among the categories against which this church does not discriminate.
- In April, Tom and Margi Callahan were welcomed into the Lakewood Presbyterian community through transfer of membership from First Presbyterian Church of

Kennewick. In October, Dorren Thomas was welcomed as a new member by way of baptism.

- Session approved of repairs to leaks and water damage in the office wing costing \$16,000.
- Session social leadership planned and held the church's annual picnic on July 30.
- PLU's Steel Rain played lively steel drum music for both worship and the picnic.
- Session approved the Terms of Call for Laura.
- Session approved the creation of children's nursery staff in August and three nursery attendants have been hired.
- Session decided not to start expensive work on asbestos and mold remediation until a commission can be convened to develop a long-term vision of the church's property and bring a proposal to Session.
- Session approved posting a part-time pianist position to replace Jennifer Matson who is leaving in January of 2024 to work full-time developing her music teaching business.

STEWARDSHIP

The overall focus of the 2023 stewardship season was, 2 Corinthians 9:7. It says, "Each person should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." Stewardship letters, which included a talent and time form, were mailed or given to members and some regular attenders. During the worship service for five Sundays, instead of just asking for pledges, members gave Stewardship minutes telling the membership how our money is spent. This began on September 17th, Connie Dunkelberger giving an overview of the special PCUSA offerings. Renea Williamson gave a list of places where the Deacons gave financial donations and/or help for the past two years on September 24th. This included sending children to Soundview Camp in the summer. The next two Sundays, Brad Tourangeau and Jim Hall gave the financial costs of administration and maintenance of the church. This included items many of us take for granted, such as insurance and security. It also included maintenance and repair of the building that are needed.

The Stewardship season ended with Pastor Laura's sermon on giving for the wrong reasons. We also had a potluck lunch after worship and turned in our pledge cards and talent survey forms. We have 20 pledging units this year, which is down from 2022's total. The decrease reflects deaths and illnesses among our membership. The good news is, the total amount of financial pledges of \$77,682 is higher than in years past.

DEACONS REPORT

The Deacons of Lakewood Presbyterian continue their work of caring for the congregation and our community in a variety of ways. 2023 was no exception, as we stayed very busy. We supported the needs of several families with funeral arrangements, assisting with services, provided monetary donations to help offset financial burdens due to extenuating circumstances, sent cards for birthdays, anniversaries, get well, etc., made hospital visits and phone calls when needed. Each month the Deacons prepare communion and serve it quarterly. Once a month we provided a celebration cake for that month's birthdays and anniversaries and provided all the supplies for coffee hosts/fellowship, such as, coffee, plates, napkins, etc.

Along with Pastor Laura, we established a "Deacon" of the month to help support the needs of the congregation. You can find the Deacon of the month listed in the weekly bulletin, as well as the Deacon bulletin board (coming soon!).

During Lent we hosted an Easter Egg Hunt and provided lunch for our community.

This summer we sponsored 2 kids and 4 families to attend Soundview Camp. To help offset the cost of camp, the Deacons organized and hosted a church rummage sale, which served two purposes; raised money for camp and helped clean out the church. We have been successful with maintaining the food pantry which is a vital part of serving the needs of our neighbors. In November 2023, we held a special offering of food during children's time which served to be both beneficial to restocking our supply and fun for the kids of LPC to participate.

Between the hard work of our Deacons and the generosity of our congregation we were able to support 4 individuals and 5 families with Thanksgiving Baskets that supported their need for food and basic necessities, as well as Christmas baskets and gifts for the same individuals/families.

As we look to 2024, your Deacons are hopeful that we will be able to continue to serve and support our congregation and our community. We already have several activities on the calendar including our annual Easter Egg Hunt, a baby shower for two special babies and a Cinco De Mayo themed Bunco and Dinner Fundraiser to help pay for Soundview Camp.

One challenge the Deacons have faced in 2023 was obtaining coffee hosts and ushers. As you look at the year ahead, we would like to invite and encourage you to sign up for these tasks. As coffee hosts, you will get the support of a Deacon to help make the coffee and provide assistance if needed. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- Rev. Buescher informed Session in May of his retirement effective in June.
- Olympia Presbytery staff coordinated with Session on the various tasks involved in calling a new pastor.
- Two of the major tasks in the early stages of calling a pastor are preparing a Mission Study and selecting a Pastor Nominating Committee.
- Under the leadership of Elder Chris Piatt, a comprehensive Mission Study was prepared involving members from a wide selection of LPC members. That study was presented to Session and approved in September.
- A Pastor Nominating Committee was convened in March and began meeting in April. Here are PNC members:

- The following weeks up until June were devoted to organizing all of the materials and data collection. The PC(USA)'s procedures were carefully reviewed and tweaked to satisfy our processes at LPC.
- Work was begun on the Ministry Information Form (MIF). The MIF is a long document containing detailed information about our church and its operations. The completed MIF is made available to all interested possible candidates.
- Every possible candidate provides a pastor information form that is used by the PNC to provide details of the experience and qualifications of an interested candidate.
- Based on those reviews, candidates are invited to telephone interviews that help both the PNC and the pastor candidate assess the possible fit for further consideration. There were a total of close to 100 candidates who fit key characteristics and allowed us to narrow down further candidates.
- By late May the pool of possible candidates was narrowed down to two candidates and an extensive telephone interview was completed that resulted in one viable candidate.
- Further contact with that candidate led the committee to invite the candidate to Lakewood for an in-person interview.

- The interviewee was Rev. Laura Nile Tuell. She had served a church in Ohio as Associate Pastor but now had a home in Tacoma.
- Rev. Tuell and her husband (David) and son Jack visited us in late July. During her visit she led worship at Fircrest Presbyterian Church and the PNC giving us a better sense of her abilities and "fit" with our congregation.
- At the congregational meeting after worship on July 30, the congregation passed a motion brought by the PNC to call Rev. Laura Nile Tuell as the new pastor. With little discussion, the motion calling Laura was unanimously approved. She officially started part-time until August after which she became full-time.
