

Reflections on 2024 General Assembly from Dan Evans

My experience of General Assembly 226 is through the lens of my unique history and relationship with the Presbyterian Church and my own personal phase of life at this time.

I am a PK, and both my father and my maternal grandfather were McCormick graduates. I was first ordained as a Deacon while in high school and moderated the youth gathering for the Kansas synod. I remember how excited my dad was when he was able to attend a meeting featuring Rev. J. Herbert Nelson.

Like many of my boomer generation, I grew away from mainline Protestant religion throughout the 70's and 80's. But when my wife and I started our family, I asked my dad for contacts that might help us find a church. This turned into one experience I'll never forget. He recommended a church with a pastor who had been a kid in one of his churches. This pastor, who became a good friend and baptized my oldest daughter, was tragically outed in a terrible event, and driven to be removed from his church. He struggled thereafter to find a place to live out his call and his gifts, and died many years later during the AIDS epidemic. Thank God for how far we have come.

Our congregational involvement over the next 30 years was touch and go, given the particular times and histories of Immanuel and Shepherd of the Hill churches. There were both good and not so good times for us. In the past eight years we have recommitted to the Church at Lakewood Presbyterian, where we have been accepted and active. I served as Clerk of Session for 6 years, and connected with Presbytery staff and wider Church polity in my role as Chair of our Pastor Nominating Committee.

I entered the world of General Assembly without any experience of the Church at the national level. A few colleagues with that experience shared a bit of knowledge, but I felt I would be largely flying blind. Thanks to Tammy's support and encouragement I found enjoyment and enlightenment. I did say yes to the nomination of Commissioner. I was quickly confronted with hundreds of documents to read and struggled to keep ahead. All in the context of around 800 commissioners, observers, advisors, and Electric Slide experts. Our training by Shari and through the videos provided to commissioners was helpful but overwhelming. I had to learn about YAADs and MADs plus assorted other cryptic entities. We were given "Equity Primes" which guided our use and approach to discussion. And we were reminded that we are seeking to be faithful together in times of disagreement.It was a long, uphill struggle for my aging brain.

Our first meetings involved three full days of committee work, done at home via 700m. We discussed recommendations that would later be presented and acted on in the plenary sessions. My committee was GAEC (General Assembly Entity Coordination) and Tammy's was Ordination. (She was lucky with her assignment because most people know what an Ordination is. I didn't have that benefit with "Entities.") Our committee tasks involved reading and discerning the nature and appropriateness of Committee Reports and recommendations.

Our committee tasks involved reading and discerning the nature and appropriateness of Committee Reports and recommendations. The committee work would subsequently be used to guide action on recommendations and overtures– including the "Olympia Overture" related to refining and improving the sections of the Book of Order (BOO) regarding our support of LGBTQ+ members and leaders.

There was a break after the committee work to give commissioners and other attendees time to travel to Salt Lake City where the plenary sessions were held. Time was provided between the plenary sessions to meet and visit with various other attendees. Tammy described that she used some of that time to visit with her seminary friends. I visited the Covenant Network and spoke with Rev. Brian Ellison the Covenant Network chair and attended a luncheon for ruling elders. The new Stated Clerk, Rev. Jinyun Oh, spoke with the attending ruling elders.

Other highlights included a wonderful and fun performance by a Scottish bagpipe and drum group and a closing ceremony performed by Japanese Taiko drums.

This General Assembly was a hybrid effort whereby committee work started at home via Zoom and then shifted to in-person plenary format for most of the active business. It is expected that the hybrid approach will be used for future Assemblies starting with the 227th Assembly in 2026.

Overall I came away with a healthy respect for GA as an important part of our church. It wasn't a perfect meeting- any effort to effectively share and dialog with a very diverse group of roughly 800intelligent and loving Children of God is bound to have its quirks and challenges. But it was impressive to watch as the Presbyterians maneuver the collection of opinions and ended with a large mixture of advances and improvements to our beloved community. I feel honored to have been one small actor in the life of PC(USA). It prepared me I think to help our congregation and grow into the potential we have as part of our Presbytery. Thanks be to God and thank you for helping me attend the Assembly.

Highlights from 2024 General Assembly from Dan Evans

- 1. New CPM process was completed
- 2.A moving presentation by a transgender member from Salt Lake City who had been welcomed heartily and praised the work of the Assembly and the larger church.
- 3.A new Stated Clerk was elected and installed. Rev. Jinyun Oh. She is the first woman to be installed as Stated Clerk and will take office for 227th General Assembly in 2027.
- 4. Heard from the stated clerk of the Church of Scotland who reported on its work with Christian Jewish Dialogue.
- 5. Recognized a Transgender Day of Visibility.
- 6. Set aside funds for Latino Ministries.
- 7. Approved the writing of a study document denouncing antisemitism and Islamophobia.
- 8. Voted to fully divest from fossil fuels. But after the Assembly ate lunch, the action was rescinded and no further action was approved. Due to the complexity of the issue it was left in the hands of Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI).
- 9.An overture from the Olympia Presbytery was easily approved to clarify and improve Book of Order revisions. The change will now go to Presbyteries across the country for final approval.
- 10. The National Caucus of Korean Presbyterian Churches asked to become a full caucus of the Assembly but the request failed to obtain approval.
- 11. The Assembly rejected Christian Zionism, voted to call congregations to take action against gun violence to protect children, and called Presbyterians to urge all elected officials to advocate ending prolonged solitary confinement in our penal systems and the use of un paid labor.
- 12. The Assembly called for a group of mid-council leaders to work with Board of Pensions to explore medical plans for pastors and spouses or families.
- 13. Special offerings were reduced to three by combining youth and children into the Joy offering.
- 14. We heard directly on how houses of worship can receive tax credits from the IRS to invest in clean energy and receive incentives for solar panels and charging stations.
- 15.A unified budget was passed by the Assembly that will combine the Office of the General Assembly and the Presbyterian Mission Agency by 2026.
- 16. New rules were approved by the Assembly for the election of moderators to be taken at the end of each Assembly instead of at the beginning.
